Uses of ESV in marine & coastal governance

informative use: to raise awareness among decision makers and the public regarding the condition & value of the environment, the role and relevance of ecosystem services and potential unidentified ision/managagement choice

Supporting & influencing governance processes

the decision making process, e.g. choices ainable and fair allocation of resources, oritisation of conservation efforts

technical use: to fine-tune economic instruments, e.g. to determine taxes and user fees, damage assessment to determine compensation or penalties


